Art Look Painted Chair

Grade Level: 4-12 Lesson Plan and Artwork by Edwin Leary, Sax Art Consultant, Florida

Description:

Painted furniture was fashionable throughout many periods of art and many cultures. Chinese lacquered furniture, Renaissance furniture, Neo-Classical furniture and Swedish Gustavian furniture are just a few examples. Now 20th century to contemporary furniture incorporates many painted, assembled and decorative elements. This particular project gives students an opportunity to develop a style of painting to apply to a chair. The painted chair can be based on many artistic styles: Cubism, Figurative, Funk, New Image, Graffiti, Impressionism or other styles. This "Art Chair" can be used literally by the Art Chairperson at a school, auctioned at a state's Youth Art Month Exhibit or for a schools fund-raising project.

Objectives:

- · Students will formulate an idea through observing how time and place in culture influence different types of expression in art.
- · Students will use different media and processes to apply creative and critical thinking skills to develop a functional and attractive style for decorating furniture.

Materials:

- Director's Chair with White Canvas Back and Seat Panels or any other fabric or unfinished wood chair
 - * Wood chairs that have been previously stained or varnished may prevent acrylic paint from adhering properly.

Directions:

- 1. Find images of painted furniture from various times and places in library books or on the Internet. Discuss with your students how the culture of each piece influenced the design. Students may wish to sketch ideas for their chair on newsprint paper.
- 2. Remove canvas panels from chair.
- 3. Lightly sketch overall design on the seat and back of the canvas panels.
- 4. Apply thin coats of acrylics with painting knives, working from light to dark.
- 5. Create a center of interest by overlapping painting-knife and/or brush strokes.
- 6. Bring out highlights and center of interest with Shiva Paintstik Oil Pastels.
- 7. Have students sign their work with an Identi-Pen. Include title, name and year.
- 8. Let chair panels dry completely.
- 9. Apply Sax Multi-Media Varnish to chair panels. Allow to dry.
- 10. Slide canvas panels back onto the chair.
- 11. For added interest, apply designs to arms and legs. Seal with Sax Multi-Media Varnish.
