Fall Pumpkins

Description:

Fall is the time for pumpkins and this is an easy way to create one. A story about pumpkins could be read. Students will create a sculptural form from clothes dryer expandable ductwork and paint it to look like a fall pumpkin. "For To Be A Farmer Boy" by Winslow Homer could be discussed with an emphasis on picking pumpkins.

Objectives:

- · Understand and apply media, techniques and processes.
- Using knowledge of structures and functions.

Materials:

White Plastic Clothes-Dryer Ducting Hose from a home improvement store 5" x 6" Piece of Lightweight Cardboard (cut from box of above product) White Artist Tape, 3/4" x 60-Yd.-Roll (460124-705) Portfolio Acrylic Paint, Orange, Pint (216634-705) Portfolio Acrylic Paint, Phthalo Green, Pint (216652-705) True Flow Optimum White Taklon Brush, Flat, Size 10 (404669-705) Heavy Duty Pliers with Wire Cutters (575902-705) Scissors, Titanium Bonded, 7" (069778-705) Silk or Plastic Leaves for Stem

Optional Materials:

Sax Nature's Impressions Leaves, Set of 10 (401957-705) Fadeless Block Printing Paper, 20-Sheet Pkg., 12" x 18", Assorted (207391-705)



Directions:

- 1. Cut a coil of ductwork that contains 22 ribs with the scissors and wire cutters. Eight feet of material (1 box) will make three pumpkins with a bit of scrap left over.
- 2. Join the two open ends together to form a doughnut shape and tape the edges together with the artists white tape. Paint this with the orange paint. Set aside.
- 3. Roll the piece of cardboard into a tight roll that looks like a stem and secure at the bottom with tape. Paint this with the green paint.
- 4. When both items are dry. Push the stem down into the center. It will hold itself there.
- 5. Add a leaf or two for a realistic effect. You may wish to make some by brushing paint on the Nature Impressions Leaves and printing on the block print paper. Your sculpture is complete.

Optional:

These forms can be stacked and grouped, or made into other configurations for an abstract sculpture assignment.

Assessment:

Does it look like a pumpkin patch? Have students write a story about a pumpkin, Halloween, the Pilgrims, or Thanksgiving.
